GERRYMANDERING ORIGINS

Souls FORTES

- Originally spelled Gerry-mander was a term coined by the Boston Gazette in March 1812.
- It was used after Governor Elbridge Gerr signed a bill to redistrict Massachusetts in favor of his party.
- The district was said to have resembled a mythological salamander.







CODE RED REDISTRICTING

It is critically important that communities of color be involved, as the redistricting process impacts our ability to build and maintain political power and advance the issues that impact our communities daily.

This redistricting education program offered training and resources to help our community understand and monitor the redistricting process and become more effective advocates for fair maps.







2022 REDISTRICTING UPDATES

WAYS TO ENGAGE

Sustaining Engagement Community-wide

Faith Action Coordinator

- Works with local congregations to coordinate issue-campaigns and GOTV efforts
- Works alongside pastors and the Social Justice Coordinators to inform congregants of any pertinent information on policy agendas and election cycles

Establish a Souls to the Polls Campaign

- Include the "6 Steps to Register to Vote" flyer in announcements and display on website. DEADLINE TO REGISTER IS OCTOBER 14.
- 100% registration campaign where membership will be asked to check and update their registration.

- Emphasize using the Voter Tool for updates around EV, visit www.ncsbe.gov
- Mobilize every member to vote at an Early Voting site, or complete and return their absentee ballot.

MAIL-IN ABSENTEE BALLOT PROCESS

Requesting an Absentee Ballot

- The ballot must be requested by filling out the Absentee Request Form
- Places to Obtain Absentee Request Forms
 - State Board of Elections Website at https://votebymail.ncsbe.gov/app/home
 - State Board of Elections Office
 - County Boards of Elections Office

Receive the Ballot. Your County Board of Elections will mail these items: 1) An Absentee Ballot, 2) Return Envelope, and 3) Instructions.

Complete Ballot and fill out certificate on the envelope. Follow instructions carefully.

Return Your Ballot in Envelope.Mail or deliver in-person to your Board of Elections by **5 p.m. on Election Day.**Do it much earlier if possible!







MAIL-IN ABSENTEE BALLOT PROCESS

Who may request an Absentee Ballot

Only a voter, near relative, legal guardian, or any member of a multi-partisan assistance team (MAT) may complete the actual request. A "near-relative" means: *Spouse, brother, sister, parent, grandparent, child, grandchild, mother-in-law, father-in-law, daughter-in-law, son-in-law, stepparent, or stepchild.*

Returning the Absentee Ballot Request

For the 2022 Midterm Election, a request form may be delivered to the County Board of Elections by 5 p.m. on November 1, by one of the following methods:

- In-person
- US Mail or designated delivery service

Who can submit the request form?

- The voter
- The voter's near relative or verifiable legal guardian
- A county multi-partisan assistance team

A THIRD PARTY, NOT FITTING ONE OF THE ABOVE CATEGORIES, <u>MAY NOT</u> SUBMIT THE REQUEST FORM







TIMELINE

Transportation Suggestions

- Individuals who participate in the caravans can drop off ballots at BOE or one stop early voting site
- Coordinate a plan with local officials for public transit for voting

Tips for a Successful Caravan

- Encourage members to request their absentee ballots
- 2. Decide on a meeting location and Caravan time
- Caravan to your Designated Early Voting Location
- 4. Snap a picture and share#BlackPowerBlackFaith and tag @ncblackalliance on Instagram.



October 20-November 5
Early Voting/Election Day:

- Include information about Early Voting dates and times in announcements, website, and social media. The Early Voting Period will be specific to local BOEs. Check your county BOE for specific hours and locations.
- There is One-Stop Voting for all Municipalities that have Early Voting.




